FEBRUARY/MARCH 2024


If you have worked with us and requested assistance with a sump pump or backflow preventer, you will be forwarded to the City of Detroit Residential Basement Backup Protection Program. This program is designed to help Detroiters prevent sewage backups and flooding in their basements, and is now moving into a phase where its jurisdiction includes Jefferson-Chalmers. <u>Here</u> is additional information about the program; they are expanding their budget to up to 18,000 per household!

Spring Reading by Black Authors

In Honor of Black History month & spring, the climate ready team has compiled a reading list of Black nature centrered books







Black Flora by Teresa J. Speight is another interesting read about the lives of 23 black flower farmers and florists and how they navigate a whitecentered industry. And if you are looking for a family-friendly story to read with children, look no further than *The Secret Garden of George Washington Carver*. Gene Barretta outlines young Carver's pursuit of growing a secret garden in the face of scorn from others who looked down upon gardens that did not grow food.

Soil, by Camille T. Dungy is about the author's experience diversifying the species of plants in her garden while living in a predominantly white Colorado neighborhood. Next, we have *The Home Place* by J. Drew Lanham, a collection of memoirs about his life experience as an ecologist, conservationist and birder living in South Carolina.
